Expectations

As freemasons we all dedicate a great deal of time physically and mentally to the craft. Our degrees are expected to be essential performance times in the lodge. The better we show our newly admitted Brother we care for our Lodge and how it looks physically and psychologically for the Brother(s) participating in the degree work the more accepted and accomplished we feel as we welcome the brothers to the Fraternity.

As Master Masons we can visit other Lodges. I strongly urge any and all who haven't already done so, visit another lodge, and observe how they work, conduct their meetings and their degrees. Some may

not be too impressive while others will astound you.

EVERYONE trips over a line or two. Prompters should work with all members of the degree work to work out the prompts they will give and when they will give them. We are all human after all and decoding a cipher then memorizing the work takes some A LOT of time.

However, floor and rod work is another essential portion of the degree and if it is done correctly it will make the degree pristine. Foot work should be militant in manner. Corners should be cut at 90 degrees. You should salute the WM prior to addressing him always. And you should be standing erect, proud to be in the lodge you are in.

Rod work. If you carry a rod, when the Lodge is open you are at work and the rod should always be with you. When you walk it is at 22 and 1/2 degrees. When you are stopped it is grounded at 90 degrees. When you salute, hold your left elbow and forearm parallel to the floor, across your chest, drop the rod into the crook of your elbow, salute and retrieve your rod.

All movements should be crisp and clean.

Again, the most important thing to remember is we are human. We all have bad days and, we are all Brothers, we are here to support one another through those times.

<u>A Message from the Secretary on the St.</u> <u>Paul Valley Scottish Rite – More Light in Masonry</u>

As most of you know, there are several appendant bodies in Freemasonry. Three of the main ones are Scottish Rite, York Rite, and Shrine. I plan to discuss each of these in the coming months. Today I am focusing on Scottish Rite.

The St. Paul Valley of Scottish Rite meets at Plato most Wednesday evenings. The Rite provides More Light in Masonry by conferring additional degrees, numbered 4-32. Upon receiving the final 32nd degree, you are deemed a Master of the Royal Secret.

Degrees emphasize and expand your understanding of the excellent tenets and principles of Freemasonry. Through allegorical playacting, emphasis is placed on the importance of personal freedom, duty, religious tolerance, morality, etc. No one who experiences the 32 degrees comes away unaffected. These lessons really solidify our Masonic teachings and teach you to truly live out these lessons.

The St. Paul Valley members support several charities, the main one being RiteCare of Minneapolis-St. Paul. RiteCare helps deserving families get needed speech therapy services for young children, truly changing their lives. The various charities are shown on an excellent presentation that runs continuously on the monitor in the Plato banquet hall. There are multiple ways to join in the Valley and take the degrees. The "normal" way is to join the fall class and take the degrees starting in September, ending in April of the following year. Alternatively, you can join in late November and get "caught up" with the fall class, continuing through April. Finally, there is a "Spring reunion" in late April in which you take the mandatory five degrees on a Friday evening and Saturday morning (similar to the One-day to Masonry).

Brothers, I have been active in the St. Paul Valley Scottish Rite for many years. It is VERY worth-while and the Brothers are great fun. Please contact me for questions and, of course, a petition!
