Lyra Chapter No. 166 held their annual Christmas Bake Sale December 13 and 14. This sale supports our High School Scholarships available to five area high schools.



GERALD ANDERSON

HUSBAND - VETERAN - FREEMASON



Gerald Anderson's life has been defined by dedication—dedication to his family, his country, and his Masonic Brothers. Born and raised in Elbow Lake, Minnesota, Gerald grew up surrounded by the values of hard work and community. Following his graduation from high school in 1944, he answered the call to service, joining the U.S. Navy during the height of World War II.

Assigned to the USS Tucson, a Cleveland-class light cruiser, Gerald played a role in the ship's operations in the Pacific Theater. His service took him to the heart of history when, in September 1945, he was stationed in Tokyo Bay, alongside the USS Missouri, during the signing of Japan's formal surrender. His naval career, which began as a seaman, led him to become an apprentice electrician, a skill that would later shape his civilian career.

After his honorable discharge in 1946, Gerald returned home to Minnesota. A close friend, already a Mason, introduced him to the fraternity, leading to his raising as a Master Mason on April 21, 1951, in Elbow Lake. Freemasonry quickly became a cherished part of his life, a source of fellowship and purpose that would remain steadfast for the next seven decades.

In 1955, Gerald and his wife, Marlys, relocated to Silver Bay, a town still in its infancy, developing alongside the expanding iron ore mining industry on the North Shore of Lake Superior. That same year, Gerald became a charter member of Taconite Lodge No. 342, helping to establish a new Masonic presence in the growing community. He worked in the warehouses of the local mines, where he built a stable career until his retirement in December 1985.

Silver Bay was home for 35 years before Gerald and Marlys moved to Baudette, Minnesota, where they spent a few years before settling in Alexandria in 2024. Despite the changes in location, Gerald's dedication to Freemasonry never wavered.


Through his involvement with Taconite Lodge, he's formed lifelong friendships that transcended time and distance. His Masonic journey came full circle on February 17th, 2025 when Gerald was honored with his 70-year service pin and certificate by the brethren of Constellation Lodge [which Elbow Lake had merged into]. The presentation was a heartfelt moment, marking not only his longevity within the fraternity but also the deep bonds he had cultivated over the years.

Gerald accepted the honor with humility and gratitude, reflecting on the countless friendships and experiences that Masonry had given him. "I am the most blessed person to have walked the face of the earth," he shared, a sentiment that perfectly encapsulates his outlook on life. At 99 years old, he remains a man of optimism and appreciation, embracing each day with a grateful heart.

His gratitude extends beyond the fraternity—he cherishes his life with Marlys, his beloved wife of many decades, and their family. The couple raised two sons, one of whom works for Lockheed Martin in New York, and the other residing near Austin. They are also proud grandparents to two grandchildren, both of whom have graduated from college and are forging their own paths.

Though he did not impart specific words of wisdom, Gerald's approach to life speaks for itself. He takes joy in the simple blessings—his health, his memories, and the people he holds dear. His ability to wake each morning without stiffness, to enjoy a conversation with a Brother, and to reminisce on a life well lived is, to him, a gift beyond measure.

Gerald's legacy is one of service, commitment, and unwavering fraternity. His presence in the Masonic community has left a lasting impact, and his story is a testament to the values of dedication and brotherhood. As he continues to welcome calls and visits from friends and fellow Masons, his spirit remains as strong as ever—a reminder that a life built on gratitude, integrity, and connection is truly a life well lived.
